

- Continues the investments into our nation's infrastructure
 - \$3.4B for highway grants
 - \$2.6B for Capital Investment Grants
 - \$800M for the Department of Transportation's RAISE grant program
 - \$1.1B for investments into our airports and transit systems
 - \$212M for seaports, the fourth year in a row I have been able to secure this funding
- Provides housing opportunities to our most vulnerable populations
 - \$30.3B in public housing vouchers
 - \$225M for the new Preservation and Reinvestment Initiative for Community Enhancement (PRICE) program, to support manufactured housing communities
 - \$3.3B for Community Development Block Grants
 - \$3.6B for Homeless Assistance Grants
 - \$1.5B for the HOME Investment Partnerships Program
 - \$1.859B for housing for persons living with HIV/AIDS, the elderly, and persons with disabilities
 - \$170M for Neighborworks, helping local communities' partner with the public and private sector to provide housing
- Supports our local community
 - \$15M for Sweetwater Infrastructure, Street, and Housing improvements
 - \$8M for the City of Hialeah for Roadway and Infrastructure Improvements

- Ensures the protection of our environment
 - \$447M for continued Everglades Restoration
 - \$40M for the National Estuary Program, which the Rookery Bay National Estuarine Research Reserve will directly benefit from
 - \$22.5M for NOAA's Harmful Algal Blooms research program, including up to \$1M for a harmful algal bloom test bed in the Gulf of Mexico
 - \$8.5M for the South Florida Geographic Program, which monitors coral health and enhances water quality
 - \$11.6M for the South Florida Ecosystem Restoration Task Force, to develop and implement responses to invasive species
 - \$75.6M for the EPA's Water Infrastructure Finance and Innovation Act program, which our local jurisdictions can utilize to upgrade their water and wastewater infrastructure
 - \$2M for coral health in South Florida
 - \$3.3M for water quality and seagrass monitoring in our local waterways
- Bolsters our Defense capabilities and provides for our servicemen and women
 - \$797.7B in funding for the Department of Defense
 - \$614.5M for SOUTHCOM and counternarcotics activities
 - Local businesses in FL-25 with proven products are expected to compete for:
 - \$15M for the Enhanced Ballistic Armor Protection System

- Funds a 4.6% military pay raise, continues to restore readiness, and provides our warfighters the housing, health care, and resources they need to defend our country
- \$40 million provided for peer-reviewed spinal cord research to help improve the lives of military members and their caregivers, families, and the public
- Ensures the safety of our schools
 - \$135 million for STOP School Violence Act
 - Of this, \$53 million for school hardening measures administered by the Community Oriented Policing Services.
 - \$12 Million for the POLICE Act administered by the Community Oriented Policing Services to provide active shooter training programs for law enforcement.
 - \$216M for School Safety National Activities through the Department of Education.
 - Language allowing Urban Areas Security Initiative (UASI) and State Homeland Security Grants to be used for school safety.
- Supports democracy abroad and our closest allies, and counters Russian and Chinese aggression
 - \$2.9B for democracy programs, to strengthen democracy abroad
 - \$50M for democracy programs in Venezuela
 - \$20M for democracy programs in Cuba
 - Not less than \$15M for democracy programs in Nicaragua
 - \$3.3B for Israel, for military assistance fulfilling U.S.-Israel Memorandum of Understanding
 - Extension of loan guarantees to Israel until FY2028
 - \$875M for U.S. Agency for Global Media (USAGM)
 - \$12.973M for Office of Cuba Broadcasting (OCB)
 - \$40M for Open Technology Fund
 - \$487M for Colombia
 - \$82M for the Caribbean Basin Security Initiative
 - \$315M for the National Endowment for Democracy
 - \$4M for the Global Cooperation and Training Framework for Taiwan

- Provides for our farmers and growers
 - \$83M for citrus greening activities and multi-agency coordination efforts
 - \$71.528M for fruit fly exclusion and detection
 - \$3.45B in critical agriculture research
 - \$4B for rural development programs which assists in building sustainable rural infrastructure
- Supports research for a cure, and aid for our seniors
 - \$15.2 million for Prostate Cancer research
 - \$10 million for providing increased access to Advanced Cancer Screening in Underserved Communities
 - Language advancing Parkinson's disease and Dementia research
 - \$180 million for Polio Eradication
 - \$1.7 billion for Older Americans Act programs
- Promotes early childhood development, school-choice and higher education
 - \$11.9 billion for Head Start
 - \$1.19 billion for Federal TRIO Programs
 - \$139 million for Magnet Schools Assistance
 - \$440 million for Charter Schools Grants
 - \$227.7 million for Developing Hispanic-Serving Institutions Program

- \$80 million for National Sea Grant College Program
- Supports our first responders
 - \$324 Million administrated by the Community Orientated Policing Services Program for the COPS Hiring Grant.
 - Of this, \$10 million for the Law Enforcement Mental Health and Wellness Act grant program to establish mental health and wellness programs for law enforcement officers.
 - \$56 Million administrated by the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration, for First Responder Training for opioid safety, including initiatives that improve access for licensed health care professionals, including paramedics, to emergency devices used to rapidly reverse the effects of opioid overdoses.
 - Of this, \$31 million carveout will focus on rural communities public and non-profit fire and EMS agencies eligibility for the grant.
- Continues the fight against the opioid epidemic
 - \$1.575 billion for State Targeted Response to Opioid Crisis Grants
 - \$6 million for Comprehensive Opioid Recovery Centers
- Helps Florida Recover Post-Hurricane Ian
 - \$3.3B in Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery funds, to support long-term housing, infrastructure, and economic recovery needs
 - \$803M for our highway systems
 - \$3.7B for crop and livestock losses in calendar year 2022
 - \$5B for FEMA's Disaster Relief Fund for disaster recovery efforts, including Hurricane Ian in Florida and Hurricane Fiona in Puerto Rico.
 - \$300M for fisheries disaster assistance
 - \$147.3M for our Defense departments to repair facilities
 - \$1.48B for the Army Corps of Engineers, to make necessary repairs to projects impacted by the hurricane and other natural disasters, and construct projects with increased resiliency
 - \$1.67B for EPA's Clean and Drinking Water State Revolving Funds for wastewater treatment works and drinking water facilities impacted
 - \$1B for the Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program to help lower-income families cover the costs of home heating and cooling
- \$2.57 billion for the Ryan White HIV/AIDS Program
- Provides \$22.4B for Pell Grants, and increases the maximum award to \$7,395
- \$35M for the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Infectious Diseases Rapid Response Reserve Fund, an account I have long supported and fought for
- \$535M for the Payment in Lieu of Taxes program, of which Collier County is the largest recipient in the state of Florida
- \$16.7B for Customs and Border Protection
- \$8.42B for Immigration and Customs Enforcement
- \$11.6B provided for the U.S. Coast Guard to support maritime security, safety, prevention and response efforts.
- \$305M provided to FEMA to support Nonprofit Security Grant programs
- Funding and report language to support operational expenses for centers that provide assistance to those with severe mental health needs who are at risk of recidivism, such as the Mental Health Diversion Facility in Miami-Dade currently under construction
- Language included for CDC to expand its Zika surveillance to determine the long-term health impacts of infants born to mothers infected with the Zika Virus
- \$302M for High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas, which includes Miami-Dade and Collier counties
- \$40.6B for communities recovering from hurricanes, flooding, wildfire, and other emergencies

- \$13.9 billion for Mental Healthcare to provide treatment and support for the 2 million veterans receiving mental health services, including \$498 million for suicide prevention outreach
- Maintains ALL pro-life protections
